“Gov. Pete Ricketts signed LB-873 on Wednesday in the Capitol Rotunda, establishing the Legislature’s tax relief bill as state law. The bill cuts income taxes and reduces property taxes for Nebraskans. Calling it a ‘historic tax package,’ Ricketts said the state was able to deliver on his legislative priority because of spending discipline over the years... The new law will lower the income tax rate for individuals by 1%, putting the rate at 5.84% by the 2027 tax year while lowering the rate for businesses from 7.5% to 5.84% in the same timeframe. It will make Social Security income exempt from state taxes starting in the tax year for 2025.
